Andrea Sáenz, Chicago Public Library

Philipp Schmidt, MIT Media Lab

Larry Britt, Providence Public Library (RI Family Literacy)

Larry Britt is a Technology Specialist and Teacher at RI Family Literacy (RIFLI). He has taught ESL, Citizenship Preparation, Workplace Readiness and Basic Computer Skills to immigrant learners. Before joining RIFLI and the Adult Education Community, he worked as a technology trainer at financial institutions for 25 years. He has had a computer on his workplace desk for the past 40 years. His career has come full circle as he's taken on a technical role at RIFLI as well as his responsibilities as RI Statewide Coordinator and Proctor Trainer for Northstar Digital Literacy Assessment and active participation on the RI Adult Education Technology Advisory Committee. program, she coordinates a city-wide system of adult education, which places over 2,500
learners annually into adult literacy and ESL programming and tracks their progress
through a central database. In her current role, she also focuses on issues relating to the
digital divide in Philadelphia. She manages the KEYSPOT program for the Commission,
which consists of a network of 50 public access computing centers across Philadelphia.
Jennifer also directs myPLACEsm Online, a series of online courses for adult learners.
Prior to joining The Commission, Jennifer was Senior Director at Foundations, Inc., where

she designed professional development and technical assistance for K-12 educators, focusing on afterschool and expanded learning. Jennifer has an M.S.Ed. from the University of Pennsylvania's Graduate School of Education.
