
Topeka Onboarding Guide


Topeka is a suite of resources to support students as they develop argumentative writing skills. Joining the Topeka community offers you and your students access to a variety of resources including:

- Lesson plans and supplementary materials to instruct students on writing argumentative essays
- Student-centric prompts with sources students can use to build their arguments
- Real-time feedback for students using artificial intelligence (AI) to help them get more feedback, faster
- Strategies for giving high-quality feedback to students while reducing your workload
- Formative assessment reports on student performance and progression over time
- Connections to a community of teachers using Topeka

Creating a Topeka Account


Ready to get started? Begin by creating an account on the Topeka website. Creating an account is the first step to gaining access to all of Topeka's resources.





Creating a New Class and Adding Students

On Topeka, you assign prompts based on class. From your **Teacher Dashboard**, set up a class for each group of students with whom you will be using Topeka. Students can join your class using the class code that will be supplied at the end of the set-up process and is also visible when you view the class from your teacher dashboard.




Assigning a Prompt

Next, select a <u>prompt</u> to assign to your students. Each prompt includes not only a topic on which your students will write, but also a set of sources available right in Topeka for students to use in their essays. If you already know which prompt you want to assign, you can easily create a new assignment and assign that prompt just by adding a few details.

We recommend assigning each prompt twice. First, assign as a **First Draft**. This allows students to create a complete draft of their essay before receiving feedback. Once students have submitted their First Draft, you can close that assignment and click "Assign again." In the new assignment, the text from a student's first draft will automatically appear and they will now have access to Signal Checks to provide them feedback as they revise.

Assigning a prompt gives your students access to Topeka's feedback through **Signal Checks**. Once students have written a draft of their essay following the prompt, the AI within the site will provide feedback and help students to improve their writing. While this feedback cannot replace you as the teacher, it can provide students with additional support and help you to focus the feedback that you give them later.
