Key Findings from our Donors Choose Study

Students Respond Positively to the Idea of Learner Variability

97% of the teachers who participated in the study noticed some change in their students after they learned about learner variability. Specifically:

- **64%** of participants noticed that their students were more respectful of learning or behavioral differences
- **54%** thought students seemed more engaged in learning
- **48%** thought students seemed better at making choices for themselves
- **45%** thought students seemed more likely to advocate for themselves
- **40%** thought students seemed better at regulating their emotions

85% of Teachers Plan to Change Instruction to Address Learner Variability

Teachers Very Likely to Recommend the Guide to a Colleague

- **98%** are likely to recommend (7,8,9, or 10 on a scale of 1-10)
- **55%** are Extremely Likely to recommend (10 on a scale of 1-10)
- 83% likely to share with a PEER
- 62% likely to share with a COUNSELOR

- 28% likely to share with a COACH
- 28% likely to share with a PARENT

Teachers More Confident About Supporting the Whole Child

92% of teachers gained some confidence (agree or strongly agree) in supporting the whole child after reviewing the Guide to Teaching Students About Learner Variability

- 92% gained confidence in supporting SEL
- **91%** gained confidence in supporting Background Factors
- 90% gained confidence in supporting Content
- 90% gained confidence in supporting Cognition
